26. first bishop of Charleston, wrote a constitution for his diocese, established the first Catholic newspaper in the U.S., opened a school for African Americans, and convinced the American bishops to met regularly to discuss national issues
27. the archbishop of New York, a poor Irish immigrant who became the defender of Catholics in New York against a severe anti-Catholicism
